4. Well-Being Data

The Alberta Education Assurance Measures indicates that there was an increase in the percentage of parents that agree "that students have access to supports and services at school".

The Alberta Education Assurance Survey indicated that there was an increase in the percentage of parents that agree "overall their reluctant readers are more positive about reading at home than they have been in the past".

The Calgary Board of Education (CBE) Survey indicated that Grade 5 & 6 students "are confident that they can learn mathematics" 84.27%. Students "who enjoy working on challenging problems in mathematics" is only 64.84%.
